SPECIAL BUSINESS

1. FS 16-040, Election of Pierce Transit Board Chair, Term Effective Until the First Board of Commissioners meeting in June, 2018

Commissioners Anderson and Henderson <u>moved</u> and seconded to elect Kent Keel to serve as the chair, with term commencing upon election and ending at the first Board of Commissioners' meeting in June, 2018. Commissioner Talbert agreed to chair the remainder of the meeting. He also noted that unless anyone has any objection, he will continue to serve on the board of the Combined Communications Network (CCN). There was no objection.

Sue Dreier, CEO, gave an introduction welcoming Dan Pike, Executive Director of Planning and Communications to the Pierce Transit team. Dan comes to Pierce Transit with a wide array of experience in transportation, long range planning and political awareness.

PRESENTATIONS

May Operator of the Month Alberto Rodriguez

Eric Gallagher, Transit Operator Assistant Manager, recognized Alberto Rodriguez for being selected May 2016 Operator of the Month. Mr. Gallagher honored Mr. Rodriguez for providing exemplary customer service since being hired in April 2007 and the Board extended their appreciation to Mr. Rodriguez for his service.

Ridership Report

Peter Stackpole, Service Planning Assistant Manager, presented Pierce Transit's latest Ridership Report that included statistics on monthly fixed route ridership YTD, suburban routes by month, urban routes YTD, express routes, trunk routes, SHUTTLE monthly boardings and vanpool monthly boardings.

Overall, findings showed ridership being up on Pierce Transit's trunk routes, and declining on Pierce Transit's suburban routes, albeit not as much as this time last year. Pierce Transit conducted an intensive outreach campaign along Route 4, which included mailing bus passes, free ORCA card offers and The Bus Stops Here books to people along the route. Mr. Stackpole concluded with noting Pierce Transit's goal is to grow ridership, not stabilize it.

Capital Projects Report

Heidi Soule, Project Management Office Manager, provided an update on Pierce Transit's latest Capital Projects Report that included updates on revenue vehicles, facilities/amenities and technology.

A short discussion ensued and clarification was given regarding project tracking, source of funding, timelines and new financial software.

Explanation: 2016 funds were allocated to contracted services in the 2016 Budget.

BACKGROUND:

The Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners authorized implementation of the Northeast Tacoma Demonstration Project at their June 8, 2015 meeting. The demonstration includes a Northeast Tacoma to Downtown express service and a partnership with King County Metro (KCM) to provide feeder service to the Pierce Transit Rt. 63

Northeast Tacoma Express. The Board of Commissioners also authorized a funding agreement with KCM at their July 13, 2015 meeting. The Northeast Tacoma demonstration service has been well received by the community and riders. Both the City of Tacoma Transportation Commission and the Pierce Transit Community Transportation Advisory Group recommended that the service continue to operate. The Board of Commissioners authorized continued operation of the Pierce Transit Route 63 Northeast Tacoma Express at their June 13, 2016 meeting.

The KCM Route 903 operates as a feeder service bringing passengers from Northeast Tacoma and the Browns Point area to Pierce Transit's Route 63 service. That agreement expires on September 27, 2016 but may be extended an additional two year term if mutually-acceptable to both parties through a written amendment to the agreement. Either party may terminate the agreement with written notice at least 90 days prior to Metro's next scheduled service change date.

KCM is agreeable to extending the agreement. Staff seeks authority to enter into Amendment No. 1 to the interlocal agreement with KCM so that feeder service can continue to operate.

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 15-071, approved on the 14th day of December 2015, the Board of Commissioners of Pierce Transit adopted the 2016 Agency Budget; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 15-037, approved on 8th day of June 2015, the Board of Commissioners of Pierce Transit authorized implementation of the Northeast Tacoma Demonstration Project; and

WHEREAS, the Interlocal Cooperation Act, RCW 39.34, permits local governmental entities to make the most efficient use of their powers by enabling them to engage in joint or cooperative action; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 15-044, approved on July 13, 2015, the Board of Commissioners of Pierce Transit authorized a One-Year Agreement with King County Metro (KCM) for Service in Northeast Tacoma; and

WHEREAS, the existing funding agreement between Pierce Transit and KCM provides for an additional two (2) year term if the Northeast Tacoma Route 903 transit service extension is deemed viable by both parties; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 16-022, approved on June 13, 2016, the Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners authorized staff to continue operating Northeast Tacoma Express effective September 11, 2016; and

Whereas, KCM has agreed to a two year extension to continue the partnership with Pierce Transit to provide feeder service to the Pierce Transit Route 63 NE Tacoma Express; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Pierce Transit as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. Pursuant to RCW 39.34, the Board of Commissioners authorizes the Chief Executive Officer to enter into and execute Amendment No. 1 to the Northeast Tacoma Route 903 Transit Service Funding Agreement, which is attached hereto as Exhibit A, with King County Metro for feeder service in Northeast Tacoma, effective September 11, 2016.

NORTHEAST TACOMA ROUTE 903 TRANSIT SERVICE FUNDING AGREEMENT

Between

PIERCE TRANSIT

And

KING COUNTY

This Amendment #1 to the Northeast Tacoma Route 903 Transit Service Funding Agreement ("Amendment #1") is made and entered into by and between the Pierce County Public Transportation Benefit Authority ("Pierce Transit"), and King County, a home rule charter county of the State of Washington, through its Department of Transportation, Metro Transit Division ("County" or "Metro"), either of which may be referred to collectively as "Parties" or individually as a "Party."

WHEREAS Pierce Transit and County have entered into the Northeast Tacoma Route 903 Transit Service Funding Agreement ("Agreement") dated July 28, 2015, to establish the terms and conditions under which Pierce Transit will provide funding for the County to extend the transit service on County's Route 903 to serve the Northeast Tacoma community and to connect that community to public transportation options in the Pierce Transit service area; and

WHEREAS the Agreement may be extended by written amendment for an additional two (2) year term if funding for the service is approved by the Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners; and

WHEREAS the Pierce Transit Board of Commissioners adopted Resolution 16-022, on June 13, 2016, Authorizing the Chief Executive Officer to continue operating Route 63 Northeast Tacoma Express Effective September 11, 2016; and

WHEREAS Pierce Transit and County now desire to amend the terms of the Agreement in accordance with this Amendment #1.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration the terms, covenants and conditions set forth below, Pierce Transit and County hereby agree as follows:

Explanation: This amendment increases the Cameras on Buses budget to include Wi-Fi and Cellular Systems on Buses as well as hiring the services of another vendor to reconfigure the existing wireless network and install additional arrays as needed.

BACKGROUND:

The Cameras on Buses project has included the purchase and installation of all components for an on-board camera system with wireless download capabilities. The system has been installed in 140 fixed route buses, not including SHUTTLE vehicles. This included cameras, wiring, DVR, external antennae, access antennae, software, training and a two-year warranty. Software was installed in 30 Public Security vehicles and three Service Supervisor vehicles which provide "Live Look-in" functionality.

The current system requires that the first responder vehicle be within 250 feet of the bus in order to log into the cameras on a bus. In some situations, this distance could put the first responder in harm's way. The proposed enhancement will allow first responders the ability to log into a bus from anywhere there is cellular coverage. In addition, this proposed cellular system is expected to improve the uploading performance of the existing camera system. An enhanced benefit of improving this system is that we will be able to provide Wi-Fi on buses for our customers.

ALTERNATIVES:

Do not proceed with amending the budget to add the additional scope at this time. This is not a recommended alternative because the expected benefits of the system would be lost and our existing system would continue to pose difficulties in logging into the system for first responders and in uploading data. .

Fund the Wi-Fi on Buses project that would be proposed in the 2017 Capital Budget if this amendment does not proceed. By waiting to fund the project until 2017, Pierce Transit's Public Safety Department would continue to experience issues with offloading videos causing them to manually pull the video from the bus instead of access it remotely. This would also delay providing Wi-Fi service on buses for customers.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Resolution No. 16-024, Amending the 2016 Capital Budget to increase the Cameras on Buses project budget in the amount of \$265,419.29 to add Wi-Fi and Cellular System on Pierce Transit Buses as well as hiring the services of another vendor to reconfigure the existing wireless network and install additional arrays as needed.

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 14-069, approved on the 8th day of December 2014, the Board of Commissioners of Pierce Transit granted Authority to Execute a Contract with Apollo Video Technology for the Purchase, Install and Software for Cameras on Buses system; and

WHEREAS, a camera system with wireless download capabilities was installed in 2015 on our fixed route buses; and

WHEREAS, a Wi-Fi and Cellular system on Pierce Transit buses would be a benefit to Pierce Transit's customers; and

WHEREAS, the Wi-Fi and Cellular system would provide first responders the opportunity to look into the bus in an emergency situation yet remain far enough from the bus to be out of harm's way; and

WHEREAS, reconfiguring the existing wireless network and will also improve the performance of the wireless offloading of the imagery recorded from the camera system; and

WHEREAS, a minimum of 136 fixed route Pierce Transit buses, will be equipped with the Wi-Fi and cellular system, excluding SHUTTLE vehicles, which will allow our customers Wi-Fi access on the bus; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Pierce Transit as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. The Board of Commissioners approves amendment of the 2016 Capital Budget to increase the Cameras on Buses project budget in the amount of \$265,419.29 to add a Wi-Fi and Cellular System on Pierce Transit Buses and reconfigure the existing wireless network.

Explanation: The equipment being purchased from Apollo Video Technology is on the state GSA contracts schedule. The expenditure includes the base system plus five spare routers, plus ten percent contingency.

BACKGROUND:

The Cameras on Buses project has included the installation of all components for a camera system with wireless download capabilities such as cameras, software, wiring, DVR, external antennae, access antennae, training and a

two-year warranty. The system was installed in 140 fixed route buses, not including SHUTTLE vehicles. Software was also installed in 30 Public Security vehicles and three Service Supervisor vehicles which provides "Live Look in" functionality.

The scope of the original project is proposed to be expanded in order to provide Wi-Fi and Cellular capabilities. The benefits of this enhancement include providing Wi-Fi for our customers, as well as allowing first responders to log into a bus from anywhere there is cellular coverage. The current system requires that the first responder vehicle be within 250 feet of the bus. In some situations, this distance could put the first responder in harm's way. In addition, the Wi-Fi and cellular router will improve the wireless uploading performance of our existing camera system saving time for Public Safety staff members who typically have to physically visit the bus to pull needed video instead of accessing it remotely.

This project aligns with our Strategic Priorities:

- Add Value to the Community through Innovative Transit Solutions by providing first responders the
 opportunity to look into the bus in an emergency situation yet remain far enough from the situation to be
 out of harm's way.
- Improve Operational Efficiencies through the improved performance of the wireless offloading of the imagery recorded from the camera system.
- Improve Customer Experience by allowing them to have the ability to perform smartphone functions such as surfing the web, paying bills remotely, catching up on social media, checking the traffic report or watching the news.

ALTERNATIVES:

Do not upgrade to a Wi-Fi and Cellular system for our fixed route bus fleet. The additional benefits of the Wi-Fi system would be lost.

Delay this project to a later date; again, this would delay implementation of the above-described benefits.

RECOMMENDATION:

A motion authorizing the Chief Executive Officer to enter into and execute Amendment No. 2 to Contract PT 32-14 with Apollo Video Technology for the Purchase of Equipment, Software and Installation of a Wi-Fi and Cellular System on Pierce Transit Buses in the amount of \$215,419.29.

Explanation: The current 5-year agreement with QBSI only includes support, maintenance and supplies for the Agency copiers. Amendment No. 1 adds full support, maintenance and supplies for all Agency printers. The expenditure amount is an estimate based on historical printer usage. The current impact to the 2016 Budget will be \$7,000 and will come from available budgeted funds in the current IT M&O Budget. This agreement includes supplies, maintenance and support costs for both copiers and all Agency printers for the next 4.5 years. Years 2017 through 2020 will be budgeted at \$151,604 per year in the 2017, 2018, 2019, and 2020 budgets. The total 4.5-year value of the agreement is \$689,220 (including tax).

BACKGROUND:

In 2015, Pierce Transit piggybacked off of a Sound Transit agreement and entered into a Print Management agreement with QBSI to provide supplies and support for our Xerox Copiers. Staff seeks to amend the scope of our Print Management Agreement with QBSI to also add supplies, maintenance and support for printers, which would

eliminate the need for an existing expiring contract, would merge all of these services into one contract for ease of administration, and free up the IT support staff currently supporting the printers to address other critical support issues.

The maintenance and support agreement rates are based on Sound Transit's Agreement No. RTA/RP 0024-14 for Enterprise Managed Print Services (EMPS). The cost per copy rate is \$0.0089 for black and white and \$0.8900 for color.

- A) ALTERNATIVES: Continue to have internal staff support and repair printers. This option is not recommended as we currently lack the staffing resources to effectively support all Agency printers along with computer, software and infrastructure support, which in turn results in inadequate customer service to our internal customers.
- B) Go out for bid for an alternate contract. This option would take more time to manage and involve a secondary vendor when we already have the foundation set for a system in place. Additionally, this option would be more expensive as we are getting lower bulk rates by utilizing the Sound Transit contract.

Explanation: This amendment increases the TDS Mid-life Maintenance budget to replace existing light fixtures to increase safety, energy conservation and to reduce ongoing maintenance costs. The funds for this budget amendment are available from Capital Reserves.

BACKGROUND:

Pierce Transit was awarded two Federal Earmark grants in the amount of \$2,209,000 from the Federal Transit Administration for mid-life maintenance at the Tacoma Dome Station Intermodal Facility in Downtown Tacoma.

Pierce Transit's local share amount is \$252,250. Sound Transit will assist with the costs for repairs done on the West Garage in the amount of \$409,795. These figures total to \$2,871,045.

The current scope of the project consists of multiple tasks to address mid-life maintenance and capital renewal issues. These tasks may include but are not limited to the Southwest elevator tower water intrusion repairs, spalling and damaged concrete repairs, painting of concrete surfaces, replacing deck joint sealants, bridge waterproofing repairs, traffic coatings at closure strips, wall joint sealants, bird control measures, re-painting of all steel surfaces, re-striping of both garages, structural supports, drainage and retaining wall repairs, and other identified repairs. Replacement of lighting is not included in the current scope for the mid-life repairs due to budget constraints.

The Tacoma Dome Station parking garages, bridges, driveways, and walking pathways are all illuminated by high pressure sodium and metal halide light fixtures. These fixtures are costly to operate and require routine bulb replacement. In addition, the fixtures are aging and as they do their ballasts begin to fail and need replacement. Ballasts for these types of fixtures are expensive and labor intensive to replace. The Condition assessment completed by Wiss, Janney, Elstner Associates, Inc. in 2013 showed that about 2 - 3% of the light fixtures were not on or were cycling off/on indicating end of life or ballast failures. Light fixtures in the stairwells, pedestrian bridges, roof, and near the perimeters of the building show signs of weather deterioration, lens discoloration, insect intrusion and rust. Replacing these aging fixtures with new LED light fixtures would decrease annual operating costs, maintenance hours, and at the same time improve both the quality and amount of light produced.

The 2014 Customer Satisfaction Survey notes that there has been a significant decrease to the overall satisfaction with Transit Centers and Park and Rides. The lack of adequate lighting was one of the concerns noted in the survey. Replacing the light fixtures with new LED fixtures will directly address the concern raised by Pierce Transit riders.

There is an opportunity to increase the local funding share of the TDS Mid-life Maintenance project in the amount of \$1,500,000 and have the mid-life repairs and lighting replacement done by the same contractor at the same time, saving procurement time and costs, along with coordination challenges of shutting down sections of the garage multiple times to do needed repairs.

The anticipated outcome is the removal and replacement of 1,400 existing high pressure sodium and metal halide light fixtures with new LED light fixtures. The benefits to Pierce Transit are greater than just the projected 30 - 40% annual operating cost savings which is significant by itself. Pierce Transit will work with Tacoma Public Utilities to acquire any possible rebates to help recover some of the costs of the project. In addition to the cost savings, overall lighting will be significantly improved. The illumination produced from LED light fixtures has been shown to provide better lighting both for users and for security camera monitoring systems. There will also be an improved sense of safety for our night time customers with better lighting. ALTERNATIVES:

1. Do not proceed with amending the budget to add the additional lighting replacement scope at this time. This is not a recommended alternative as the condition of the lighting will continue to deteriorate, lighting levels will not

improve, customer dissatisfaction will continue to rise, and annual operating and maintenance costs for the existing lighting system will continue to be much higher than what they could be.

2. Fund the lighting replacement project in the 2017 Capital Budget. This alternative is also not recommended because it will cause another shut down of the parking garages while the work is being done. In addition to this the project will likely not be able to start until 2018 because the contractor working on the mid-life repairs will have occupancy of the parking garages through most of 2017.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Resolution No. 16-025, amending the 2016 Capital Budget to increase the TDS Mid-life Maintenance project budget to include lighting improvements in the amount of \$1,500,000.

WHEREAS, this resolution increases the project budget by \$1,500,000 from our reserves to include in the current project scope the replacement of light fixtures in the parking garages, stair towers and bridges which will increase the project budget from \$2,871,045 to \$4,371,045; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Pierce Transit as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. The Board of Commissioners authorizes Pierce Transit to amend the 2016 Capital Budget to increase the TDS Mid-life Maintenance project budget to include lighting improvements for safety and energy conservation in the amount of \$1,500,000 increasing the project budget from \$2,871,045 to \$4,371,045.

Explanation: This amendment adds four Transit Center/Park and Ride Renewal projects to the 2016 Capital Budget. The funds are available from reserves that were set aside for System Refresh.

BACKGROUND:

The Transit Centers and Park and Rides are some of Pierce Transit's oldest facilities and are showing significant signs of deterioration. Many times they are the place where riders first meet the 'face' of Pierce Transit. The 2014 Customer Satisfaction Survey notes that there has been a significant decrease to the overall satisfaction with Transit Centers and Park and Rides. Availability of shelters, amount of lighting, and safety waiting after dark are all identified as key indicators in improving customer satisfaction. The renewal projects will provide an opportunity to address issues raised by the public to improve the public's perception of safety, and provide a better Pierce Transit experience for riders by making necessary repairs to the Transit Centers and Park and Ride lots.

The projects include improving the overall deteriorated and run-down appearance, fixing trip hazards, repairing cracked and failing asphalt surfaces, improving lane markings, and ADA improvements. It includes replacing light fixtures with new modern LED fixtures for better lighting for night time users, replacing signage that is outdated or

missing, re-striping and numbering of parking stalls, repairing damaged curbing, roadway and parking surfaces, renewing landscaping, repairing damaged shelters, replacing and adding customer seating, re-painting painted surfaces, and other needs as identified.

The benefits to Pierce Transit are many. An investment in renewing these Transit Centers and Park and Ride lots is a means of ensuring sustained current ridership and further ridership growth. To do so will build trust in the community that the transit operation is stable and financially sound. The renewal of the center improves our image in the community which in turn builds support for increased ridership. A renewed Transit Center is an attractive Transit Center that encourages existing customers to continue to use our transportation services.

Through recent customer satisfaction surveys Pierce Transit has become aware that the state of the Transit Centers has and is impacting their satisfaction and sense of safety. When people don't feel safe or they view a facility as rundown, trashed, ugly, or unmaintained their trust in the rest of the organization soon follows. The same is true for the surrounding community and businesses who want to encourage their employees and customers to use public transportation. They are much more inclined to do so if those facilities appear safe, clean, and well maintained. The benefit of renewing the transit centers is increased sense of safety, increased community and business support, improved customer satisfaction.

The Projects proposed to be added to the 2016 Capital Budget include:

- 72nd St. and Portland Ave. Transit Center Renewal in the amount of \$750,000
- Tacoma Community College Transit Center Renewal in the amount of \$900,000
- Tacoma Mall Transit Center in the amount of \$850,000
- SR-512 Park and Ride Renewal in the amount of \$500,000

ALTERNATIVES:

Fund only \$240,000 in the 2016 Capital Budget to begin the design phase of the projects and fund the construction phase to renew the Transit Centers in the 2017 Capital Budget.

Do not approve amending the 2016 Capital Budget to include the renewal of the Transit Centers and Park and Ride lots that are in need of significant repairs and improvement. Delaying the renewal of these facilities will accelerate the rate of deterioration and it will be costlier in the future to restore the facilities. In addition to costlier repairs in the future, doing nothing continues to erode customer satisfaction based on the poor visual and physical condition of the facilities.

Do not fund these projects in 2016. The projects would be proposed in the 2017 Capital Budget and could be funded to begin in 2017. By waiting to fund the project until 2017, we risk losing the opportunity to begin design work in 2016 so that we could go out to bid for construction in early 2017. If we delay, we would miss the good weather window required for asphalt repairs which would not be able to be done until 2018.

Explanation: The study will be funded with \$200,000 from agency reserves and \$50,000 provided by the City of Tacoma through a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

BACKGROUND:

This resolution requests an amendment to add the Commerce Placemaking project as a new project to the 2016 Capital Budget in the total amount of \$250,000. The project will create a Tacoma Theater District Transportation & Culture Plan with the aim of bringing about a vibrant, visually appealing destination for cultural, artistic, civic, and local marketplace activities, a destination that is well-served by multiple forms of transportation and offers convenient transit connections. Important dimensions of the plan will be to consider the role of public transportation and how it can best support and enhance the cultural activities in this location, as well as how art and cultural activities can best complement public transportation. The project provides for stakeholder engagement, plan development, technical studies and conceptual designs that will leverage the existing public investments and attract additional public and private investments to the district.

Pierce Transit partnered with the City of Tacoma and the Broadway Center for Performing Arts (BCPA) for a Creative Placemaking grant to conduct this project; the partners were recently awarded \$50,000 from the National Endowment for the Arts' "Our Town" Program. Each of the partners owns or operates significant assets that can contribute to economic development and revitalization of this district. This project is an opportunity to use best practices in urban design, creative placemaking, transit oriented development, and public art to better connect the transit hub with the BCPA and other cultural activities, increase pedestrian flow, and foster economic vitality. The expected outcome will create a safe sense of place where community members want to gather and express themselves, enhance this district, and strengthen access and usability of the publicly owned spaces in this urban center.

This project will result in a plan and concepts that will guide further design work, public investment, and encourage well-thought-out and appropriately planned private development. Special attention will be paid to achieving these goals using the publicly-owned assets in this district including:

- Pierce Transit Commerce Street Turnaround/Layover Facility: Downtown transit hub that includes an
 indoor turnaround/bus storage area for 18 coaches, vacant commercial space, a drivers' recovery lounge
 and restrooms, public restrooms, and a large-scale fountain located between the street and Theater
 Square.
- Pierce Transit Theater Square: A central public space above the bus turnaround facility that will be redesigned to serve multiple users and multiple purposes year-round. The plan will address how this central public space will become more user-friendly, welcoming, and actively programmed, maintained, and managed.
- Commerce Street between S.9th and S.11th Streets: The important transfer hub for transit passengers in downtown Tacoma that includes Tacoma Link Light Rail, seven bus bays and passenger waiting zones, and is served by 18 Pierce Transit, three Intercity Transit, and two Sound Transit bus routes.
- **North Park Garage**: a City-owned paid-parking garage built in 1969 with frontage on Commerce Street and stalls for 492 cars.

The City of Tacoma will be the recipient of the \$50,000 NEA grant funds, which will be passed on to PT via a future intergovernmental agreement to administer a consultant contract. Pierce Transit committed to at least \$50,000 in local cash match for the grant. To complete the scope of the Commerce Placemaking project, staff has estimated a total project budget of \$250,000. In-kind commitments from all partners, including PT, City, and BCPA staff time, event space, and expertise, show real commitment from the partners to make this project a success.

ALTERNATIVES:

An alternative would be to not conduct the study. However, Pierce Transit has committed to at least \$50,000 match for the NEA grant, so the partners would risk loss of the \$50,000 in grant funds. In addition, PT's Commerce turnaround facility is in need of significant mid-life maintenance. Leveraging those future necessary maintenance funds for a project that enhances the facility and the district in a transformative way will put those future funds to greater use. The investment in this study sets the stage for how to best spend those funds.

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RECOMMENDATION:

Approve Resolution No. 16-027, amending the 2016 Capital Budget to add the Commerce Placemaking project to the 2016 Capital Budget.

WHEREAS, Pierce Transit staff proposes to hire a Consultant team to use best practices in urban design, stakeholder engagement, creative placemaking, transit oriented development, and public art to better connect the Commerce Street transit hub with the Broadway Center for Performing Arts and other cultural activities, increase pedestrian flow, and foster economic vitality; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Commissioners of Pierce Transit as follows:

Section 1. The 2016 Capital Budget is herewith amended to add a new capital project: Commerce Placemaking Project in the amount of \$250,000, \$50,000 of which will be provided by the City of Tacoma through a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, with the remaining \$200,000 funded by Pierce Transit reserves.
